The MCAT, AMCAS Application, and Interview

- MCAT
 - Test prep course and a local tutoring company
 - Best resource was the practice MCAT exams on the AAMC website
- AMCAS Application
 - Get your LORs early and apply early
- Interview
 - Research the most commonly asked questions
 - Look at your resume/CV and be prepared to answer questions based on what you have done




Best Advice

- Research programs that can help prepare you for medical school.
- Self reflect---know your strengths and weaknesses.
- Obtain a premed advisor---Don't do it alone!
- Don't let your age or any other obstacle dictate your future goals!



Admissions Criteria

The Admissions Committee assess the "whole" applicant using holistic review and balances an applicant's experiences, attributes, and metrics in a way that will help HWCOM achieve its mission.

HWCOM has provided access through the use of holistic review to students who would have been overlooked if only metrics were considered.



Characteristics/Experiences

- Motivation toward practicing caring, compassionate medicine
- Exposure to clinical medicine, such as physician shadowing and hands-on patient care activities
- Altruism demonstrated by commitment to voluntary community service activities
- Research exposure
- Leadership skills and experience
- Teamwork/ability to work with others
- Unique and enriching qualities often demonstrated by overcoming obstacles, diversity of experiences, and distance traveled
- Attributes that include interpersonal and communication skills, integrity, maturity, conscientiousness, empathy, resilience, and emotional stability



Top Six Important Tips

- Keep a journal of your activities.
- Take the MCAT exam when you are ready.
- Use the AMCAS Experiences to tell schools who you are.
- Submit all materials in a timely manner.
- Apply to schools you share a common mission with.
- Beware of the dream killers!





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

Application Experience

Roadblocks:

- "You're never getting in!" (pre-med advisor)
- "You're getting in everywhere!" (lab directors)

Interviews: your personal statement matters!

- "I read your personal statement five times this morning..."
- "Jimmy, let's talk about life…"
- "Jimmy, I can't wait to read your book..." (Ruth Gotian)
- "Oh, your MCAT.....it's on the lower end. Tell me why..."






- Find your best cheerleaders



RUTH GOTIAN'S TIPS

- APPLY EARLY, APPLY EARLY!
- Have at least one long term research experience.
- Have a letter of recommendation from every significant research experience.
- Think long and hard about why you want to be a physician-scientist. Have that passion come through in your personal statement.
- Have your recommenders write comparative statements.
