It has always been our practice to consider grades in the context of numerous other aspects of the application, and an international crisis certainly provides a unique and compelling context. In making this statement, we are cognizant of the fact that some undergraduate schools are providing an option for students to take courses either for grades or on a Pass/Fail basis. We therefore want to be explicit that applicants should not feel pressured by us to choose the graded option.</p> <p>Online Coursework– The faculty of the UCR SOM require that students demonstrate a strong foundation that indicates preparedness to engage the curriculum. Our preparation areas are required, however we recognize that there is an increasing degree of variety in premedical course tracks and course offerings at colleges and universities. We further recognize that students may meet these competencies through alternative means or courses, including online. On our secondary application we invite applicants to explain and describe how they have met the requirements through course work and/or additional means. The committee will NOT systematically disqualify candidates due to variation in course completion. The committee will holistically evaluate the preparation of candidates for the school of medicine with a strong focus on science foundation and professional competencies.</p>

We will not consider MCAT scores taken in early 2025</p> <p>Applicants will not be invited to submit a secondary application unless they have an MCAT score available</p> <p>For all applicants, we will make decisions regarding interviews without consideration of the MCAT score (i.e. the MCAT score will be hidden from the applications that our screeners will review)</p> <p>If an applicant was able to sit for an MCAT exam but feels their MCAT performance or ability to take the MCAT was significantly adversely affected by a pandemic-related issue, we will allow a short statement describing that hardship or adversity to be appended to their secondary application.</p>

Information regarding PASS/FAIL grades and online instruction, and necessity of the MCAT can be found below. The following notifications apply to both the MD and MD-PhD programs.</p> <p>PASS/FAIL GRADES AND ONLINE INSTRUCTION: Required pre-medical classes play an important role in preparing students for the curriculum at YSM. Given the challenging circumstances surrounding COVID-19, YSM Office of Admissions will be cognizant of the fact that many colleges and universities elected to change their grading policies midterm from letter grades to PASS/FAIL, or to offer students the choice to make such a decision. We believe that individual colleges and universities are best equipped to make decisions on their grading systems, and YSM Office of Admissions will respect and trust each college/university's response to grading policies, and those of students, with regard to the entirety of 2020-2022 (spring, summer, and fall).</p> <p>YSM permits applicants to take pre-medical requirements online provided the courses include laboratory work (where applicable, as detailed in our pre-medical requirements). Students will be asked to specify any pre-medical courses taken online when filling out the YSM Secondary Application.</p> <p>YSM Office of Admissions and the admissions committee will take circumstances surrounding 2020 through 2022 into account when evaluating the applications of all students enrolled in classes in 2020 through 2022. As such, prospective applicants to YSM enrolled in pre-medical classes in 2020 through 2022 should, if applicable, make decisions that they believe are best for them in context of their individual situations.</p>

Schmidt COM takes pride in conducting a Holistic Review of applications submitted. FL	Florida State University College of Medicine	<p>All applicants must receive a bachelor's degree by the time of matriculation. Admission to the Florida State University College of Medicine (FSU COM) is a highly competitive process with approximately 7,000 applications reviewed to select the students admitted. A number of academic and personal factors are considered by the Admissions Office and the Admissions Committee when admitting students to medical school.</p> <p>The FSU College of Medicine employs a holistic approach during the admissions process. Regarding admission to the regular M.D. program, we evaluate all of the following: course "load" and undergraduate rigor; post baccalaureate course work; service and volunteer record; shadowing and knowledge of the medical field; research activities; likelihood of practicing within the State of Florida; undergraduate grade point average; MCAT score; and degree of "fit" with respect to our unique mission statement.</p> <p>While a truly holistic approach to admissions makes it difficult to establish minimum academic standards, the Florida State University College of Medicine does not – except in special circumstances – consider applicants for admissions to the regular M.D. program who do not have an MCAT score of at least 498, and an undergraduate grade point average of 3.3. Special circumstances include students who come from medically, financially, or educationally disadvantaged backgrounds. Finally, the Florida State University College of Medicine does not – except under rare circumstances – consider applicants who are not legal residents of the State of Florida, unless such applicants can demonstrate significant ties to Florida.</p> <p>If an applicant is currently enrolled in a degree program, the program must be completed and transcripts provided to the FSU COM Admissions Office prior to the beginning of classes, unless an exception is granted by that program.</p> <p>The Admissions Committee at the Florida State University College of Medicine (FSU COM) is comprised of approximately 60 members and includes faculty from all FSU COM departments, fourth year medical students, and community physicians.</p> <p>When considering applicants for admission, the Committee utilizes all appropriate information including academic, personal, experiential, and demographic data in the selection process. Personal qualities such as motivation, sensitivity to the needs of others, excellent oral communication skills, and maturity receive particular attention along with strong academic credentials. In addition, personal attributes such as compassion and altruism that are, in the view of the committee, essential to the art of good medical practice are of special interest in the selection process.</p> <p>The Committee is especially interested in applicants who have demonstrated through their lifestyle, consistent motivation for service to others. Applicants from underrepresented groups, applicants from rural and inner city backgrounds, women, and non-traditional applicants are of particular interest.</p>

However, we recognize that the course of study changes resulting from COVID-19 may have changed the depth and character of applicants' interactions with letter writers: faculty, supervisors, university administrators and staff. Total hours of interaction may be curtailed, and the specificity of comments may be less or have a different tenor because of a lower number of in-person contact hours.</p> <p>Medical Exposure/Experiences/Public Service – Due to quarantine, social distancing, and other virus mitigation policies; it may be more difficult for applicants to accumulate significant preparatory experiences such as volunteering, shadowing, and other opportunities for medical exposure. To address this, we recommend consulting your pre-health advising center if you are still in college. You may want to research opportunities in your local community. Local volunteer organizations may have suggestions for acceptable opportunities. Check with organizations you have volunteered with in the past to see if you can assist in previous roles. Consider online opportunities, like tutoring or mentoring. Take an online class, listen to podcasts, or read articles and books about public health, bioethics, or another health-related topic that interests you.</p> <p>Accepted applicants may select "Plan to Enroll" beginning February 19. Applicants with multiple acceptances should narrow their choices to three schools by April 15. By April 30, applicants should select "Commit to Enroll" for their final choice of medical school, and withdraw acceptances from all other schools. If an accepted applicant is holding acceptances at schools other than UWSMPH after June 1, we reserve the right to rescind our acceptance. Applicants with extraordinary circumstances requiring additional time to make a final decision should contact our office as soon as possible. Applicants may remain on alternate lists at other medical schools after selecting "Commit to Enroll."</p>
